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Classifying the types of equine-assisted activities and therapies

This chart compares equine-assisted activities (EAAs) with equine-assisted therapies (EATs), including the subcategories within each. *Equine-assisted activities and therapies* (EAATs) is the umbrella term covering everything offered in this field. The word "assisted" means the service is done in partnership with a horse.

Be aware that for equine-facilitated psychotherapy and equine-assisted psychotherapy, the terms "assisted" and "facilitated" aren't based on research. The variation in terms adds to the confusion of both the public and healthcare providers as to what these services provide. Instead of going strictly by the name of the service, it's best to find out exactly what the specific service offers and the experience and background of the person providing it.
