- 32% of respondents reported a significant lack of communication between staff and management.
- 63% of the respondents were able to identify at least one AACN essential in their new place of employment after graduation.
- Likert scale showed an average of:
  - 80% of students feel competent to begin their new career upon graduation.
  - 75% of students feel confident in their skills.

### Implications

Post implementation of the survey, investigators found that additional research is

needed regarding resiliency training in nursing curricula. Nurse resiliency is tied to greater confidence, job satisfaction, increased mental health, and overall hardiness. This experience could be gained through immersive simulation, debriefing, and training in nursing curricula. Investigators hope to evaluate students as they progress into the workforce at six months and one-year post graduation. ■
